'Over 160,000 Syrians return to terror-free regions'

ANKARA - More than 162,000 Syrians have returned to terror-free regions in Syria following Turkish military-led **Operation Euphrates Shield** and Operation Olive Branch, said Turkey's deputy director general of Migration Management. "Following the Operation Euphrates Shield and Operation Olive Branch, more than 162,000 Syrians have returned to regions cleared of terrorists. 'European law should include Islamophobia'

ANKARA - The Turkish foreign minister on Wednesday urged European countries to include Islamophobia as a crime in their constitution, without waiting for a Holocaust-like situation to unfold. "We should ensure that Islamophobia is included in [European] constitution as a crime clearly," Mevlut

Cavusoglu said during an event at capital Ankara marked to unveil the latest European Islamophobia Report (EIR). 15 Daesh-linked terror suspects arrested



ISTANBUL - At least 15 foreigners were arrested in Istanbul for their alleged links with the Daesh terrorist group on Wednesday, according to police sources. The anti-terrorism police teams conducted raids simultaneously in eight districts after they were tipped off about the presence of Daesh suspects planning terrorist attacks, said the sources, who asked not to be named due to restrictions on

talking to the media.

Numerous documents and digital materials linked with the terrorist group were also seized during the operations. Turkish security forces have been involved in a longrunning campaign to clear Daesh from Turkey. 257 dead as Algerian aircraft crashes near capital

ALGIERS - At least 257 people were killed when an Algerian military aircraft crashed on Wednesday near the capital Algiers, according to Algeria's Defense Ministry. In a statement, the ministry said the aircraft crashed in a field near the Boufarik military base in Bilda province, less than 20 miles from Algiers. It said the military aircraft was heading for Bechar in

southwestern Algeria when it went down.

A total of 247 people and 10 crew members were killed in the crash, the ministry said, adding that most of the victims were military personnel and some of their families. It remains unclear whether there were any survivors in the crash.

The Defense Ministry said Algerian army chief of staff, Lieutenant General Ahmed Gaid Salah, has ordered an investigation into the crash. According to local media, the Iliouchine-type plane had been

transporting dozens of troops and equipment... MORE DETAILS
