### 'World is more polarized after Trump'

IZMIR - The 2016 presidential election in the U.S. has upset the world, creating a new global crisis, the Turkish parliament speaker said Thursday. Binali Yildirim, who attended an economic forum in the western Turkish province of Izmir, slammed U.S. government policies after President Donald Trump took office in November 2016.

"Especially after the U.S. election, the world became more polarized. Protectionism and arbitrary decisions [of the U.S. government] has accelerated an unpredictable global crisis," he said. 
