RAMALLAH - The Palestinian Authority on Friday welcomed the rejection of UN General Assembly of a U.S. draft resolution condemning Palestinian resistance group Hamas. In a statement, the Ramallah-based authority thanked member states that voted against the U.S.

ANKARA - Turkey plans to open 35 more Turkish Trade Centers in various regions worldwide, the country's trade minister said on Friday. "Currently we have five



Melting ice could lead to 7-meter sea rise



ANKARA - Melting Greenland ice sheets may raise sea levels as much as an eye-popping seven meters (23 feet), endangering coastal cities like New York, Lagos, and Shanghai, according to a new study.

Researchers at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution in Falmouth, Massachusetts found that glaciers on the world's second-largest island are melting more than 30 percent faster than during the mid-1900s. Today, these rates are "off the charts," said glaciologist Sarah Das, who is a co-author of the
