Attack on opposition leader 'unwelcome'

ANKARA - Turkish president on Monday said the attack against opposition leader Kemal Kilicdaroglu has been investigated thoroughly. Six people, one of them identified as Osman Sarigun, allegedly attacked Kemal Kilicdaroglu, head of the Republican People's Party (CHP), on Sunday when he was attending a Turkish soldier's funeral. Describing the physical attack "an unwelcome act of violence",

Erdogan said he won't let anyone disturb the peaceful climate in Turkey. "Unfortunately, some unwelcome incidents took place yesterday during the funeral for one of our martyrs in Cubuk [district of Ankara] and protests against CHP leader Kemal Kilicdaroglu turned into an act of violence," he said on Twitter. "The incident is investigated thoroughly at all levels. We

Pakistan, Iran to form 'joint reaction force' on border

Understanding came at meeting between Pakistani Prime Minister Khan and Iranian President Rouhani in Tehran



ISLAMABAD - Pakistan and Iran on Monday agreed to set up a Joint Rapid Reaction Force to protect the common border between the two countries and promptly act against militants, Pakistan's state-run media reported. The understanding came at a meeting between Iranian President Hassan Rouhani and visiting Pakistani Prime Minister Imran Khan in

Tehran, according to Radio Pakistan. On April 18, heavily-armed assailants had shot dead at least 14 personnel of Pakistan's security forces after offloaded them from buses on main highway that connects the country's commercial capital Karachi to strategic Gwadar port in Balochistan province. On Saturday, Pakistan's foreign minister

said the gunmen had come from Iran and that Islamabad shared all information with Tehran about the incident. Addressing a joint news conference with Pakistani prime minister, aired by staterun PTV news, the Iranian president said they will not allow anyone to harm brotherly relations between Iran and Pakistan. "In recent days, we witnessed some tension in the border areas

where terrorists perpetrated their nefarious acts but we will not allow anyone to harm our good relations with Pakistan," Rouhani said. "We want to establish links between Chahbhar ports [Iran] and Gwadar, [a strategic port in southwestern Pakistan to strengthen our commerce relations" Rouhani said.He said his country is ready to meet the oil and gas, and electricity... Ameena Begum, 22, is stitching a dress at a sewing center located at a refugee camp in the Cox's Bazaar town of Bangladesh. Begum, a mother of one, is among the thousands of Rohingya Muslims who fled a military crackdown which started on Aug. 25, 2017 in Myanmar's Rakhine state to Bangladesh. She no longer waits for aid

to come to her. Instead, she spends a good part of the day making both male and female dresses at a training center run by Turkiye Diyanet Foundation (TDV), an aid organization under Turkey's religious authority. "It seems to me now that I am a human being and I am doing something for my family. I dream of going

back to my homeland [Rakhine] and set up a small tailoring shop there," Begum told Anadolu Agency Another Rohingya trainee at the sewing center, Morium Hatun, said: "After losing my own country I am now living in a country where I can work.
