Iran's parliament puts CENTCOM on terror list

TEHRAN- The Iranian parliament on Tuesday approved a bill placing the U.S. Central Command (CENTCOM) on the country's terror list, according to the

official IRNA news agency. The decision came in response to Washington's blacklisting of Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC) as a terrorist organization. IRNA said the decision

came to "counter the U.S. move to weaken peace and security of the region and the entire world by labeling IRGC..., as a terrorist group." It also qualifies the Iranian government



'New IRA' admits killing journalist

Armed republican group, which formed in 2012, offers 'full, sincere' apologies to family, friend of victim

BAKU -Dissident republican group the New IRA has claimed responsibility for the killing last week of journalist Lyra McKee in Northern Ireland. In a statement issued early Tuesday to The Irish News, the group admitted that its activists killed the 29-yearold reporter, according to local media reports. "In the course of attacking the enemy, Lyra McKee was tragically killed while standing beside enemy forces," the group said in the statement. "The IRA offer our full and sincere apologies to the partner, family and friends of Lyra McKee for her death," it added. McKee,

who had been observing a police operation in the Creggan area of the city of Londonderry, was shot dead Thursday night. Assistant Chief Constable Mark Hamilton said the shooting happened when police were searching for munitions and firearms after tips that terror attacks were planned for the Easter weekend. He called McKee' death "horrendous and unjustified". "A single gunman fired shots in a residential area of the city and as a result wounded Ms. McKee," Hamilton said in a statement Friday. "Officers quickly administered first aid before transporting her in the back of a Land Rover to hospital ... MORE DETAILS

41,000+ voters to be probed in Istanbul

ANKARA -Turkish Supreme Election Council (YSK) will investigate over 41,000 ineligible voters following a contest by the ruling Justice and Development (AK) Party to the Istanbul poll results of last month's mayoral election. On Tuesday, the YSK held a meeting to discuss the ruling party's extraordinary appeal to cancel the election

results in Istanbul. In its interim decision, the top election authority announced that it decided to probe 41,132 voters of the March 31 elections, as well as the presiding officers and polling station staffs who are not civil servants. Putin, Kim to meet on Thursday

Russian, North Korean leaders first-ever meeting to be held in Vladivostok

MOSCOW -Russian President Vladimir Putin will meet North Korean leader Kim Jong-un on Thursday, a Kremlin official announced on Tuesday. The first-ever meeting of two leaders will take place in the Russian port city of Vladivostok, Putin's aide Yury Ushakov told reporters in the capital Moscow. "The program of negotiations is typical, it suggests a conversation in

a narrow format, and then there will be talks between the delegations," Ushakov said. "Neither the signing of documents or statements has yet been scheduled. A joint statement has not been worked out or planned yet," he added.
